 Orange County participates in FEMA's National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) since early 1980's

 NFIP sets minimum requirements for community floodplain management practices

• Allows residents to purchase flood insurance





 Orange County also participates in FEMA's Community Rating System (CRS) since early 1990's

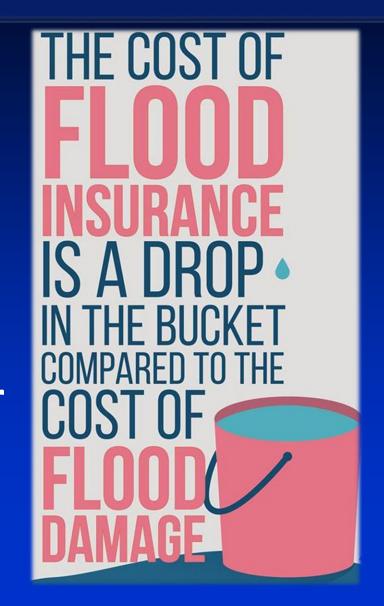
The CRS is a voluntary incentive program that recognizes and encourages community floodplain management practices that exceed the minimum requirements of the NFIP





FEMA's Community Rating System (CRS)
provides residents with
flood insurance discounts

■ Current flood insurance discount for Orange County residents is 25% for properties in special flood hazard areas (SFHA) and 10% for those outside SFHA.

■ CRS Class: 5

■ Premium Discount: 25%

Number of Policies: 10,105

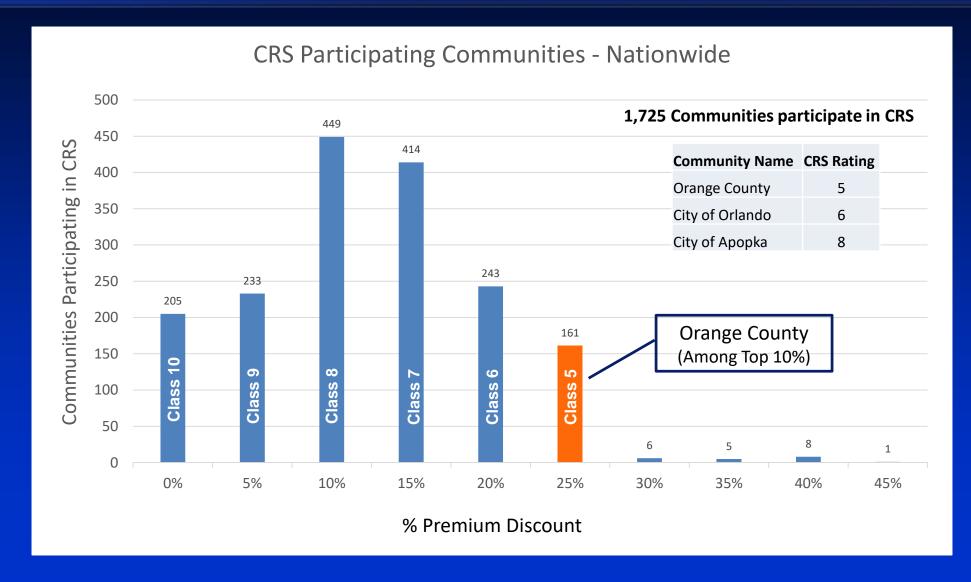
Average Savings: \$74

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 Update Floodplain Ordinance to comply with FEMA's NFIP revised standards

 Update of Floodplain Ordinance will allow Orange County to pursue a better CRS Class 4





 The Florida Division of Emergency Management provided a FEMA-approved floodplain management Model Ordinance



The Model Ordinance explicitly coordinates Floodplain
Management regulations with the Florida Building Code

The Florida Building Code contains the flood building standards that meet or exceed the NFIP requirements

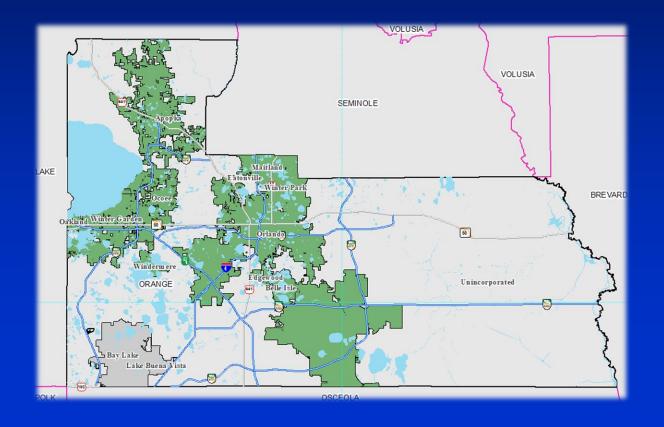


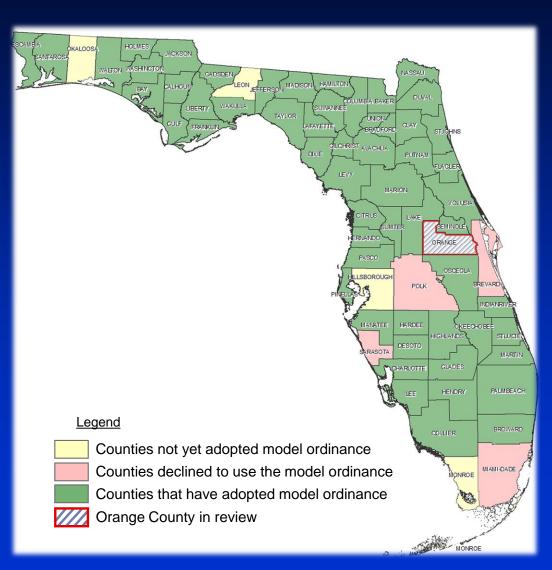
- The Model Ordinance is designed to:
 - -eliminate the possibility of having conflicting or duplicative regulations
 - keep local programs consistent with the Florida Building Code, even when the Florida Building Code changes over time

-incorporate clarifying language from FEMA guidance documents to address problems Division of Emergency Management has observed in the field

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Ordinance Overview

Chapter 19 – Floodplain Management

Text revised to eliminate the possibility of having conflicting or duplicate regulations

 Adds references to Florida Building Code and ASCE 24 (Flood Resistant Design and Construction)





Ordinance Overview

Chapter 19 – Floodplain Management

Removal of building structural requirements from Chapter 19

- Building structural requirements referenced to Florida Building Code
 - The Florida Building Code contains flood building standards that meet or exceed the NFIP requirements





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Chapter 19 – Article I, Division 1 - Definitions

- Sec. 19-5
 - -4 definitions remain unchanged
 - -19 definitions contain minor text revisions
 - -10 definitions revised
 - -14 definitions added
 - -32 definitions deleted



Chapter 19 – Article I, Division 3 - Floodplain Administrator

- Sec. 19-21 to Sec. 19-28
 - -Text revised for floodplain permitting and coordination with Building Official and appropriate regulating agency
 - Applicants to provide documents to support FEMA-LOMC
 - Duplicate/outdated record requirements removed from text



Chapter 19 – Article II, Division 3 - Compensatory Storage

- Sec. 19-107
 - -Clarifies requirements for achieving compensatory storage
 - Volume for volume "cup for cup" methodology
 - Compensation at each elevation for all storm events less than 100-year



Chapter 19 – Article II, Division 4 - Manufacture Homes

- Sec. 19-111 to Sec. 19-116
 - References requirements governing foundations, placement, utility equipment, and enclosed areas to Florida Building Code
 - –New manufactured home parks/subdivision not permitted in
 - regulatory floodway
 - -Bottom of the frame is 48" or more above grade





Proposed Amendments

Chapter 19 – Article II, Division 5 - Tanks

- Sec. 19-131 to Sec. 19-134.
 - -Tanks (above and underground) to be anchored and constructed to prevent flotation, collapse or lateral movement from hydrodynamic and hydrostatic loads.

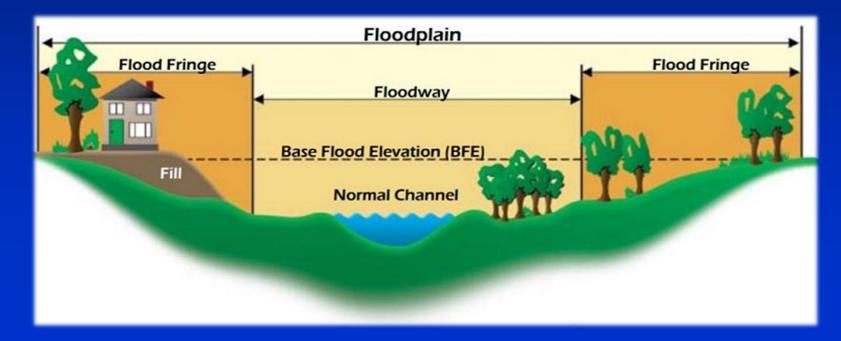






Chapter 19 – Article II, Division 8 - Development in Floodway

- Sec. 19-151 to Sec. 19-154
 - -Clarifies requirements for development within floodway (e.g. fences, retaining walls, sidewalks, roads, crossings)





Chapter 34 – Development within areas of special flood hazard

- Sec. 34-228
 - -Text clarifications (e.g. base flood instead of one hundred year flood)
 - -Reference to Florida Building Code
 - -Reference to new Chapter 19 Sec. numbering



Chapter 9 – Article II Building Code – Division 1. Building

- Sec. 9-33 & Sec. 9-35
 - Deletion of outdated text
- Sec. 9-33 & Sec. 9-39
 - Addition of flood related damage text (substantial damage/improvement)
