Brief Overview of Previous Actions

- BCC Meeting (June 5, 2018)
 - Staff provided presentation on retail pet stores and puppy mills
 - There were three options presented for moving forward:
 - Maintain status quo
 - Advocate for state legislation
 - Revise the county code to include ban
 - Subsequent research led to no change to the ordinance



Brief Overview of Previous Actions

- BCC Meeting (February 12, 2019)
 - Retail pet store ban brought back before the Board
 - Concerns at that time:
 - Efficacy of the ban in solving the problem of puppy mills
 - Change to the ordinance would push the problem to other jurisdictions while not resolving the problem
 - The issue would be better explored at the state level
 - No action recommended

BCC Meeting (February 9, 2021)

- Retail pet store ban brought back before the Board
- Staff were asked to prepare a work session to provide:
 - updated information from June 2018 work session
 - comparison of the ordinances adopted by other counties in Florida
 - lawsuits and legal actions from resulting bans
 - lending practices
 - statistics on puppy sales and outcomes
 - information and perspectives from current pet retail store owners and others





Overview of Commercial Breeding



- 2,460 federally <u>licensed</u> dog breeding facilities
- 213,978 dogs kept <u>solely</u> for the purpose of breeding in these facilities
- 1,307,407 estimated number of puppies produced each year

 10,000 estimated dog breeding facilities in the U.S. (both licensed and unlicensed)

 2.6 million estimated number of puppies sold annually from licensed and unlicensed facilities

Regulatory Framework

- Federal Level: United States Department of Agriculture (USDA)
- Animal Welfare Act (AWA) signed into law in 1966
 - Only regulatory mechanism that governs "the humane treatment of animals bred for purposes of sale"
 - Governs standards of care related to food, water, housing, sanitation, etc.
 - Enforces inspection based on risk level (high risk... low risk)
- States are allowed to pass stricter laws




Regulatory Framework

*This graph does not rank the quality or enforcement of the laws.

State Level:

- 16 states without laws regulating commercial breeders
- FS 828.073, 828.12,
 828.13 animal welfare laws
- SB 1138 and HB 45 proposes full ban retail sale of dogs and cats (do not prohibit the adoption of stricter municipal or county ordinance)





Regulatory Framework

Local Level:

- Orange County does not have specific laws addressing commercial dog breeding facilities
- Orange County Code (Chapter 5, Sec. 5-40):
 - Commercial kennels and pet dealers who derive more than 25% of their income from the sale of dogs and cats, must register and pay a \$26 annual fee; and
 - Make premises available for annual inspections by Animal Services Officer to ensure compliance with standards of care: housing, bedding, lighting and ventilation, separation by species, contact person, disease or illness, water, food, and sanitation

Comparison of County Ordinances

- 12 Florida Counties that have passed ordinances related to retail pet stores
- Ordinances can be grouped into 3 categories:
 - Grandfathered 33%
 - Adoption based model 33%
 - Full Ban 33%

Osceola	2019	Yes	Grandfather	Animal Services/up to \$500
Nassau	2020	No	Full ban	\$500.00 per day per animal or imprisonment not to exceed sixty days
Pasco	2020	Yes	Grandfather	Animal Services & Code Enforcement/ \$500 for each offense
St. Lucie	2020	No	Adoption-base	Enforcement entity unknown

Lawsuits and Legal Actions

- Most counties with existing pet stores allowed those stores to continue operations and banned new pet stores.
- Exceptions: Hillsborough and Sarasota counties
- Both were sued over their pet sale ordinance



Lawsuits and Legal Actions

Sarasota County

- Banned all retail sales of pets and gave a one year period for existing stores to cease operations
- Existing store sued County
- Case settled by store agreeing not renew lease in Sarasota County and moved to neighboring Manatee County



Lawsuits and Legal Actions

Hillsborough County

- Adopted ordinance banning new retail sales of pets in 2018.
 Allowed existing shops to continue to operate.
- Amended the ordinance in 2020 and banned ALL pet stores including existing stores after puppy mill discovered in Tampa area.
- 1 of 2 existing pet store owners filed suit. Litigation is ongoing.
- Pet store owner challenging the ordinance has relocated the store to neighboring county

Puppy Sales and Outcomes

- There are 7 retail pet stores in Orange County:
 - 2 are located in Unincorporated Orange County
 - 3 are located in the City of Orlando
 - 1 is located in the City of Apopka
 - 1 is located in the City of Ocoee



Puppy Sales and Outcomes

- Documented complaints (2019 and 2020)
 - Orange County Consumer Protection Unit = 6
 - Misrepresentation, scam, health
 - Florida Department of Agriculture/Department of Consumer
 Services = 11
 - Misrepresentation, scam, health
 - Orange County Animal Services = 51
 - 19 (37%) sick or injured puppy
 - 26 (51%) sanitation, housing conditions or general care
 - 6 (12%) concerns with the health of the puppies in the store

Options Moving Forward

Status Quo:

No changes

Await Outcome of Proposed Bills:

SB 1138 and HB 45

Geographic Coverage:

- Orange County wide
- Unincorporated Orange County



Options Moving Forward

Ordinance Language to Amend Animal Services Code:

- Grandfather model (ban <u>excludes</u> existing retail pet stores)
- Full ban (<u>prohibit</u> retail sales of cats and dogs in existing and new stores)
- Adoption-base model (<u>require</u> pet retail stores to <u>only</u> source dogs and cats from shelters and rescues)
- Increase restrictions on sourcing and reporting requirements
