

East of Oakdale Street, Windermere, Lake Bessie





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






Panoramic photograph (looking east) of Lake Bessie taken on January 16, 2018













Site Plan







1. The effect of the proposed plan or development on the use of said waters in said district for transportation and recreational or other public purposes and public conveniences:

The proposed project will not prohibit others from accessing or using the lake. The buoys themselves are not a navigational hazard since they are easily visible to boaters and are made of a soft plastic which is pushed out of the way should a collision occur with a boat. This is supported by the State of Florida Division of Administrative Hearings (DOAH) case no. 02-2940/02-2941 (Buchner v. Gronlund).

2. The effect of the proposed plan or development on the free use of waters and waterways within the district:

When in use, the ski course will preclude lake use in the vicinity of the course; however ,this is no different than skiing and boating activity occurring without a course. This is supported by the DOAH ruling which states "...preemption of part of the lake, which is inherent in any ski course and boating in general, does not constitute a navigation hazard or an infringement of riparian rights to access to the lake."

3. The effect of the proposed plan or development upon erosion control in the said district:

The purpose of the proposed slalom course (which produce small wakes generally between 3 to 4.5 inches high) combined with the distance from the shoreline (a minimum of 300 feet) and moderate vegetative coverage, will not cause erosion to the shoreline. This is supported by the DOAH case.

4. The effect of the proposed plan or development upon the flow of waters in said district:

5. The effect of the proposed plan or development upon formation of stagnant pockets likely to collect debris:

6. The effect of the proposed plan or development upon the natural beauty and recreational advantage within said district:

The visible portion of the course (the floating buoys) are relatively unobtrusive and do not impede the view of the lake. Additionally, the buoys are less visible from a great distance, and will be placed a minimum of 300-ft from the shoreline.

7. The effect of the proposed plan or development upon the conservation of wildlife, marine life, and other natural resources:

The effects of erosion and turbidity, which can affect wildlife, are minimized as stated above. Additionally, the impacts to the lake from a slalom course are not dissimilar to the effects caused by boating in general and skiing without a ski course. This is supported by the DOAH case.

8. The effect of the proposed plan or development upon the upland surrounding or necessarily affected by said plan or development:

 EPD has received several inquires/objections concerning the effect of the course on the view of the lake, the disturbance such a course would create in an otherwise quiet area, a perceived increase in boating activity, and concerns for safety, navigation and access.

- Project reviewed in accordance with Chapter 33, Article IV. Windermere Water and Navigation Control District; Section 33-129(d).
- The applicants propose to install an approximately 902-foot long slalom ski course, consisting of 22 buoys. The closest distance from the shoreline is 310 feet at the proposed location.
- EPD reviewed the findings of fact from a State of Florida Administrative Hearing for a similar ski course design on Lake Blanchester, located in Lake County.
- The lake bottom of Lake Bessie is privately owned. The submerged lands on which the ski course will be anchored are either owned or have been leased by the applicants.

- The use of the course will be limited to private recreational purposes. Commercial use of the course will be prohibited.
- The original slalom course was installed in a different location on Lake Bessie without a permit and was subject to enforcement action (17-485019). It was subsequently removed and the enforcement case was closed.
- Notification of the public hearing was sent to all shoreline property owners on Lake Bessie.
- EPD has received objections from several lakefront property owners.
