



Second Substantial Amendment to the
2019-2020 One-Year Action Plan

On March 27, 2020, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) was signed into law making available supplemental Community Development Block Grant (CDBG-CV) and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG-CV) funds to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus pandemic (COVID-19). The CARES Act for CDBG was released through three funding rounds; the first going directly to the entitlement jurisdictions participating in the CDBG program; the second going directly to states, administered through an application process under their small cities program; and the third round of CDBG-CV3 issued directly to entitlement jurisdictions.

On June 23, 2020, the Board approved a Substantial Amendment to the 2019-2020 One-Year Action Plan to enable the County to receive and administer the funding from the Department of Housing and Community Development (HUD). The Substantial Amendment incorporated supplemental funding received under the CARES Act (CDBG-CV1 and ESG-CV1).

The proposed Second Substantial Amendment to the 2019-2020 One-Year Action Plan incorporates additional funding allocations and outlines activities that aid in preventing, preparing for, and responding to the COVID-19 pandemic. The proposed budget for the Second Substantial Amendment includes funding from the supplemental CDBG-CV3 Program in the amount of \$8,156,612, and from the supplemental ESG-CV2 in the amount of \$5,016,437. The Community Development Advisory Board reviewed and approved the proposed amendment on February 24, 2021.

A public notice outlining the proposed CDBG-CV3 and ESG-CV2 budgets and planned activities was posted on the Orange County Housing and Community Development website. The public notices were also published in El Sentinel (Spanish) and Orlando Sentinel (English) on March 27, 2021 and March 28, 2021, respectively. The public notices announced the proposed amendment and availability for review and comments from March 29, 2021 through April 5, 2021.

Given the need to fund these activities as soon as possible, we are once again seeking a delegation of limited authority for the County Administrator to execute the grant agreements for CDBG-CV3 and ESG-CV2 for each agency being funded under the Second Substantial Amendment to the 2019-2020 One-Year Action Plan.

ACTION REQUESTED: Approval of Second Substantial Amendment to the 2019-2020 One-Year Action Plan; approval and execution of: 1) Application for Federal Assistance SF-424 and Assurances-Construction Programs for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG-CV3); 2) Application for Federal Assistance SF-424 and Assurances-Construction Programs for Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG-CV2); 3) Certifications; 4) Specific Community Development Block Grant Certifications; 5) INTERIM ESG-CV Certifications (NON-STATE); and delegation of limited authority for the County Administrator to execute subsequent CDBG-CV and ESG-CV Grant Agreements with the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and Subrecipient Agreements for CDBG-CV3 and ESG-CV2 funds, consistent with the projects and activities outlined in the Second Substantial Amendment to the 2019-2020 One-Year Action Plan and the budgetary amounts set forth therein.
