

Red Light Camera Program

Annual Summary Report FY 2024 – 2025

The Orange County Red Light Camera Program supports the County's Vision Zero initiative by enhancing intersection safety, reducing red light violations, and advancing the goal of eliminating traffic related fatalities and serious injuries on County roadways.

Orange County currently operates 57 red light cameras at 35 intersections located within unincorporated areas of the County. Effective July 1, 2024, Florida Statute 316.0083 was amended to require municipalities and jurisdictions that operate red light camera programs to provide an annual report of program results to their local governing body. This report must be presented both as a written summary and read aloud at a public meeting.

The table below contains the required information for the July 1, 2025 to June 30, 2025 reporting period:

Notes:

- *RTOR denotes Right Turn on Red, a new statistic in the required reporting. Orange County has one intersection with 2 approaches where this is enforced.*
- *Total fine amount for NOV is \$158 and UTC is \$262.*
- *Due to overlap within the reporting period as to when violations are paid, the data in this chart do not all total to the same values.*

The following table shows the sources the funds collected were disbursed and their amounts:

Orange County's revenue was allocated as follows: \$2,364,560 was paid to the vendor for services, \$150,000 covered costs and salaries for contract administration, \$1,200,000 was used for contract enforcement, and \$50,000 were spent on miscellaneous equipment and program costs.

The remaining Orange County revenue in the amount of \$1,575,113 is placed in the Public Works budget and used for multiple traffic related safety projects to achieve Orange County Vision Zero goals including performing studies, traffic calming devices, pedestrian crosswalk improvements, and new signal installation at intersections.

Data shows an overall reduction of approximately 36% in total crashes at intersections monitored by red light cameras since the program's inception in 2013.
