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### ■ BCC Work Session: June 18, 2024


 Homeless Services Network is the lead agency in the Central Florida area for Coordinated Entry

- 2024 Point in Time count:
  - 28.5% increase in total number of homeless from 2023 to 2024
  - 153% increase in unsheltered homeless from 2023 to 2024
  - Orange County has a gap in shelter space of approximately 926 beds





### **Heat Map from 2024 PIT Unsheltered Count**





 House Bill 1365 (2024) prohibits counties and municipalities from allowing any person to regularly engage in public camping/sleeping on any public property, except as designated by the county and certified by the State





### County funded homeless services

- Prevention/Diversion Services
- Rental Assistance
- Shelter/Drop-in Center Operations
- Supportive Services/Intervention
- Outreach
- Rapid Rehousing
- Capital Improvements/Renovations/Construction
- Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)



- County's financial commitment for homelessness services across all departments:
  - -**FY 23/24:** \$45,647,991.16
    - (ARPA: \$10,365,215.39)
  - **-FY 24/25** \$46,548,596.84
    - (ARPA: \$6,300,000.00)



- BCC approved *additional* \$10M for FY 24/25
- New FY 24/25 Total: \$56,548,596.84

#### Expand Existing Services

- Expanding Outreach Team capacities (Proposed funding per year: \$750,000)
  - Target population: unsheltered individuals and families
- —Increase Bridge Housing capacity (Proposed funding per year: \$1.5M)
  - Bridge Housing: Temporary housing for someone waiting on a permanent unit
  - Target population: individuals and families
- —Increase Permanent Supportive Housing capacity (Proposed funding per year: \$1M)
  - Permanent Supportive Housing: Housing assistance with supportive services to assist the chronically homeless
  - Target population: individuals aged 50+, have chronic health conditions





### Expand Existing Services

- Eviction Prevention for
  Pregnant Mothers (Proposed funding per year: \$150,000)
  - Target population: women with newborns, high-risk for negative maternal and fetal outcomes
  - Nurse Family Partnership and the Healthy Start Coalition of Orange County - current Orange County SAMHSA Grant





### Expand Existing Services

- Fund intensive case management training (Proposed funding per year: \$200,000)
  - Provides consistent case management training and community resources to our partnering social services agencies





### Increase Shelter Capacity

- Interdepartmental Work Group is in the process of identifying options throughout the County
  - Mental Health and Homelessness
  - Real Estate
  - Housing and Community Development
  - Zoning
  - Planning
  - Building Safety
  - Capital Projects
  - GIS



### Increase Shelter Capacity

- Target criteria
  - Initial focus on Orange County-owned properties
  - East and West Orange County
  - Up to 150-bed capacity
  - Will include: day services, case management, etc.



Proposed funding per 1<sup>st</sup> year: \$1.325M

-Target population: male and female adults



#### Launch New Initiatives

- -Steel Modular Units
- -24/7 Homeless Diversion Center
- –Center for Addiction and Mental Health Programs (CAMP) Orange
- Housing Connector
- Emergency Bridge Housing with Services
- –Valencia Accelerated Skills Training (AST)
- Housing for Youth Aging out of Foster Care







#### Steel Modular Housing Units

Expand permanent supportive housing in different locations to include supportive services for the chronically homeless

- Utilize for Permanent Supportive Housing
- Exploring various manufacturers
  - My Tiny Home Hub model at 400 sq. ft.
    - Room for 1 2 people, 1 bathroom
    - \$22,000 per unit includes delivery & install
  - PLAD Homes ECO model at 160 sq. ft.
    - Room for 1 2 people, 1 bathroom
    - \$12,000-\$18,000 per unit
  - Other models
- Proposed funding per year: \$1.85M



- Target population: Unsheltered individuals



Homeless Diversion Center –Three Bridges Program

Provide emergency bridge housing and supportive services for clients aged 50+

- Maxwell Gardens Apartments are an existing supportive housing program
- 24/7 Diversion Center with 10 rooms located at Maxwell Gardens
- Provides permanent housing placement, 24/7 case management, food and employment assistance



Proposed funding per year: \$725,000

- Target population: Unsheltered aged 50+



Center for Addiction and Mental Health Programs (CAMP) Orange

Provide transitional housing and services for unhoused individuals with cooccurring disorders

- Existing program in South Florida expanding to Orange County
- Renovated an existing hotel previously known for criminal activities
- Total of 54 beds for transitional housing with behavioral health overlay
- Medical approach to treating co-occurring behavioral disorders through day-to-day programming and focus on holistic wellness
- Collaborative initiative with Central Florida Cares Health Systems (Managing Entity) and Orange County Office for a Drug Free Community
- Proposed funding per year: \$1M

- Target population: Unsheltered individuals



#### Housing Connector

Increase access to housing for the homeless population by expanding the available affordable housing market, creating stability for the unhoused and at-risk population

- Utilize Zillow platform to increase available housing opportunities, landlord partnership and market for affordable housing
  - Supportive case management services combined with housing/landlord placement
- Bridge between Property Partners with vacant units, government, and Community Partners who work with the unhoused
  - Includes risk mitigation, emergency rental assistance, & operations for the Orange County area
- Proposed funding per year: \$500,000
  -Target population: At-risk or homeless



#### Housing Connector

- **—Benefits for renters:** 
  - Potential emergency rental assistance
  - Reduce screening criteria
    - Waive credit history/past debt
    - Accept 2 evictions



#### Benefits for property partners:

- Access to streamlined customer service and a financial guarantee package that reduces financial risk and vacancies
- Comprehensive Stability Support Single point of contact for providers, residents, and properties



### Emergency Bridge Housing with Services

Provide temporary housing in hotels to reduce shelter population for families

- Expanding services with current providers
  - Providers to hire additional case managers
- Up to 30 hotel rooms and 2 rooms for office space
  - Could lead to the reduction 120+ unsheltered homeless people
- Collaborate with Housing Connectors and HSN for transition to permanent housing
- Successful example: Snohomish County's Bridge Housing Program

Proposed funding per year: \$1M

-Target population: Unsheltered families



### Valencia Accelerated Skills Training (AST)

Assist Orange County residents who are homeless or making inadequate wages to find employment in higher-paid, vocational trades to live with greater stability

- Partnership with community agencies to identify candidates for Valencia AST programs
- Collaborative effort with Community Action and Citizens' Commission for Children
  - Housing and related living costs; childcare costs
- Competitive starting wages, beginning at \$17-\$20 per hour
- Proposed funding per year: Included in Bridge Housing expansion
- Target population: High risk and/or unsheltered





### Housing for Youth Aging out of Foster Care

Provide supportive housing on-site for youth aging out of the Foster Care system to reduce potential future homelessness

- Microhome village will house up to 60 people
- Nonprofit agency partnering with HomeAid for construction
- Orange County is researching to deed property to a community partner




Proposed funding: Pending

- Target population: Youth aging out of foster care




Expanding Services - \$3.6M from additional \$10M





### ■ New Initiatives - \$6.4M from additional \$10M





- Orange County Funding for Homeless Services
  - -BCC approved additional \$10M for FY 24/25
  - -New FY 24/25 Total: \$56,548,596.84
  - -90.5% of projects from the additional \$10M help with housing
    - Approximately 1,020 additionally housed



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### Background

- -March 20, 2024 Governor signed House Bill 1365 (2024).
  - Created a new Section 125.0231, Florida Statutes, on October 1, 2024, that prohibits the County from authorizing or allowing any person to regularly engage in public camping or sleeping.



### Background (continued)

- -June 18, 2024 Board held work session on homelessness.
  - Discussed HB 1365 and a pending U.S. Supreme Court case that could impact the County's ability to respond to the new Statute (City of Grants Pass, Oregon v. Johnson, 144 S. Ct. 2202 (2024)).
  - Planned to update the Board after an opinion was published in City of Grants Pass.



- Background (continued)
  - -June 28, 2024 SCOTUS published an opinion in City of Grants Pass.
    - Held that local government ordinances that prohibit sleeping or camping on public property do not violate the Eighth Amendment's Cruel and Unusual Punishments Clause.



### Background (continued)

- -October 1, 2024 Orange County met with local municipalities and law enforcement agencies to discuss the response to HB 1365.
  - Central Florida Tourism Oversight District
  - City of Apopka
  - City of Bay Lake/Lake Buena Vista
  - Town of Eatonville
  - City of Maitland
  - Town of Oakland

- City of Orlando
- Town of Windermere
- City of Winter Garden
- City of Winter Park
- Orange County Sheriff's Office



#### Section 125.0231, Florida Statutes

- —General Rule: The County may not authorize or otherwise allow any person to regularly engage in public camping or sleeping on County property.
  - "Authorize or otherwise allow" is not defined.
  - "Public camping or sleeping" means lodging or residing outdoors overnight. Does not include lawful motor vehicles.
  - "Property" includes any County building or its grounds and any public right-of-way.



- Section 125.0231, Florida Statutes (continued)
  - -Exception: The County may designate public property for camping and sleeping for a period of 1 year if said property is certified by DCF and meets certain minimum standards.
    - Minimum standards = safety and security, sanitation, behavioral health services, and prohibiting illegal substance and alcohol use.
  - -Statute does not apply during certain states of emergency.



- Section 125.0231, Florida Statutes (continued)
  - -<u>Enforcement</u>: Beginning <u>January 1, 2025</u>, residents, business owners, or the Attorney General may bring a civil action against the County.
    - The complaint must include an affidavit attesting that the County
       "...failed to take all reasonable actions within the limits of its
       governmental authority to cure the alleged violation within 5 business
       days after receiving written notice..."
    - If a resident or business owner prevails, then a court may award reasonable expenses including court costs, attorney fees, investigative costs, witness fees, and deposition costs.



### Optional County Actions

- 1) Alternative Lodging. The County can offer alternative lodging to people engaged in public camping or sleeping that does not violate the Statute (e.g., indoor housing or Designated Property).
- 2) <u>Trespass.</u> The County can trespass people regularly engaged in public camping or sleeping pursuant to Florida's trespass law (Section 810.09, Florida Statutes).
- 3) Ordinance. The County can adopt an ordinance that prohibits trespassing, public camping, or both.
  - May reduce the risk of litigation under the new Statute
  - May provide the County with a defense in litigation under the Statute



### Other Jurisdictions – Counties

County	Camping Ordinance
Miami-Dade County	Section 21-286 of the Code prohibits overnight camping on County property. Requires warnings and offer of shelter (if available).
Broward County	Adopted Ordinance No. 2024-37 on October 8, 2024. Prohibits public camping and sleeping on County property. Requires verbal and written warning.
Palm Beach County	Section 21-30 prohibits camping at County parks. Section 21-63 authorizes law enforcement to trespass individuals that violate state or local law while on County property.
Hillsborough County	Sections 38-24 and 38-25 prohibit camping and sleeping in parks.
Pinellas County	Section 90-7 prohibits camping without a permit.
Seminole County	Seminole County staff has indicated that the BCC will consider adopting an ordinance prohibiting public camping and sleeping in December 2024.
Osceola County	Adopted a Statement of Legislative Intent on November 4, 2024, directing staff to draft an ordinance prohibiting public camping and sleeping.



### Other Jurisdictions – Local Municipalities

Municipality	Camping Ordinance
City of Apopka	Section 42-151 prohibits public camping. Section 42-2 creates a trespass policy for public property.
City of Bay Lake	City staff has indicated that the City is developing an ordinance.
City of Belle Isle	Section 18-13 prohibits camping in parks.
City of Lake Buena Vista	City staff has indicated that the City is developing an ordinance.
City of Maitland	Section 11-4.6 prohibits sleeping in parks. Adopted Ordinance No. 1420 on August 14, 2023, creating a trespass policy for public property. Staff is proposing an additional ordinance that prohibits public camping (as of 10/17/24).



### Other Jurisdictions – Local Municipalities (continued)

Municipality	Camping Ordinance
City of Ocoee	Section 59-2 prohibits camping on all public property in the City.
City of Orlando	Section 43.52 of the Code prohibits camping on all public property.
Town of Windermere	Sections 18-14 and 18-15 prohibit camping.
City of Winter Garden	Section 118-11 prohibits camping on all public property in the City.
City of Winter Park	Adopted Ordinance Nos. 3321-24 and 3322-24 on October 17, 2024, creating a trespass policy for public property and prohibiting public camping and sleeping, respectively.



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- County's total annual investment: \$56,548,596.84
- Implementation plan for additional \$10M has been developed
  - -\$3.6M on Expanding Current Services including Outreach, Bridge Housing,
    Permanent Supportive Housing, Eviction Prevention, and Case Management
    Training
  - -\$6.4M on New Initiatives including Steel Modular Units, 24/7 Homeless Diversion Center, CAMP Orange, Housing Connector, Emergency Bridge Housing, Valencia AST, and Housing for Youth aging out of foster care
  - -90.5% of this additional funding will support additional housing
  - –Approximately 1,020 people housed



### Increasing shelter capacity remains a priority

- Interdepartmental work group is continuing to develop shelter options
- Considerations
  - Initial focus on Orange County-owned properties
  - East and West Orange County
  - Up to 150-bed capacity
  - Will include day services, case management, etc.



- HB 1365 enforcement starts January 1, 2025
- County strategy:
  - Mental Health & Homelessness to implement expansion of existing services, increased shelter capacity, and new initiatives
  - Board direction regarding development of a trespass policy and/or County ordinance prohibiting public camping

 Holistic response to the needs of the homeless while also minimizing the risk of litigation associated with HB 1365
