Homicide Clearance Rate


• National Clearance Rate of Murder Offenses: 52.3% (2022 FBI)

5 Year Crime Trend




5 Year Residential Burglary



Traffic Crashes

Field Service Officers (FSO) have started investigating and working minor crashes in Unincorporated Orange County

Started June 4th

Current staffing includes 22 FSOs split between East and West

As of July 2nd FSOs have completed 40 crash reports

 Uniform Patrol Deputies currently being trained and should be completed by December



Proposed Budget Highlights

Personnel Services

- 4% salary increase to non-bargaining employees and contractual increase for bargaining members
- Statutorily mandated increase in FRS rates for sworn and civilian positions
- Anticipated increased Health Insurance costs


