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- December 13, 2016
 - District 5 Commissioner brought forward League of Women Voters request
 - -Draft Resolution to State Legislature
 - Support for a minimum state funding amount
 - Specifically for conservation land acquisition
- Mayor instructed staff to provide a presentation on the issues



State Conservation Land Funding Programs



- State Conservation Land Funding Programs
 - -Prior to 1963 no specific program existed
 - Legislative line item appropriations
 - Donations from private individuals
 - Donations from federal government



- State Conservation Land Funding Programs
 - -Prior to 1963 no specific program existed
 - -1963 Land Acquisition Trust Fund
 - Funded the Outdoor Recreation and Conservation Program
 - Designed to purchase parks and recreation areas
 - Tax on outdoor clothing and equipment
 - Later changed to sale of recreation bonds (\$20M)
 - Paid for by doc stamps




- State Conservation Land Funding Programs
 - -Prior to 1963 no specific program existed
 - -1963 Land Acquisition Trust Fund
 - -1972 Environmentally Endangered Lands Program
 - Ballot referendum authorizing the sale of \$240M in bonds
 - Designed for "unique and irreplaceable lands"
 - Paid for by doc stamps

- State Conservation Land Funding Programs
 - -Prior to 1963 no specific program existed
 - -1963 Land Acquisition Trust Fund
 - -1972 Environmentally Endangered Lands Program
 - -1979 Conservation and Recreation Lands Program
 - Recurring revenue stream (instead of bond revenues)
 - Excise tax on mineral extraction later added doc stamps
 - Protected 181,000 acres at a cost of \$356M

- State Conservation Land Funding Programs
 - -Prior to 1963 no specific program existed
 - -1963 Land Acquisition Trust Fund
 - -1972 Environmentally Endangered Lands Program
 - -1979 Conservation and Recreation Lands Program
 - -1990 Preservation 2000
 - 10 year plan to collect \$3B in bonds
 - \$300M annual budget
 - Funded existing programs (CARL, Save Our Rivers, etc.)
 - Managed by FDEP
 - Protected 1.8M acres

- State Conservation Land Funding Programs
 - -Prior to 1963 no specific program existed
 - -1963 Land Acquisition Trust Fund
 - -1972 Environmentally Endangered Lands Program
 - -1979 Conservation and Recreation Lands Program
 - -1990 Preservation 2000
 - -2000 Florida Forever (current program)
 - Funded through doc stamps
 - \$300M annual budget
 - Over 718,000 acres protected

- Florida Forever
 - —Funding history
 - \$300M from 2001 to 2009
 - Great Recession
 - Funding reduced





County Program

- -1990-2003 Environmental Sensitive Lands program
 - 12 parcels (TM Ranch, Savage Christmas Creek)
- -2003-Present "Green PLACE"
 - 18 parcels (Johns Lake, Eagles Roost)
 - \$20M Initial funding
 - \$125M Invest in Orange funding
- -Funding from various partnerships





County Program





Constitutional "Amendment 1"



- -2014 Ballot Initiative
 - Title: Water and Land Conservation Dedicates funds to acquire and restore Florida conservation and recreation lands
- -Allocates 33% of net revenues from doc stamps
- -20 year period
- -Overwhelmingly approved by voters 75%
- -Legislature responsible for appropriations



Constitutional Amendment

- -Limits funds to:
 - acquisition and improvement of land, water areas, and related property interests;
 - wildlife management areas;
 - lands that protect water resources and drinking water sources;
 - lands in the Everglades; beaches and shores; outdoor recreation lands, including recreational trails, parks, and urban open space; rural landscapes; working farms.

Court Challenge

- -2015 appropriations bill approved less than \$20M for Florida Forever
- 2 lawsuits filed
 - House and Senate
 - Regulatory Agencies
- -Alleging misspending of \$300M in funds
- Both suits recently combined
- No decision likely in short term



Funding Challenge

- -2017-18 LATF estimate \$814M
 - \$646M after debt service payment
 - \$438M after Everglades, springs and Lake Apopka payments
 - \$105M after agency operations and land management costs
 - \$20M after leadership priorities currently proposed for bills
- -Likely shortfall for other conservation priorities



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Proposed Resolution

- Support a minimum annual \$300M funding
- Strictly for land acquisition
- Regional benefits
 - 1st magnitude springs
 - Pine Island Slough
 - Adams Ranch
 - Wekiva-Ocala Greenway









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- Bring back as proposed
- Possible amendments:
 - add local interests (Wekiva Basin, Econ, etc.)
 - add reference to Sustainability Plan
 - consider "funding goal" for conservation programs
 - request flexibility of funding for local acquisition and management

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
