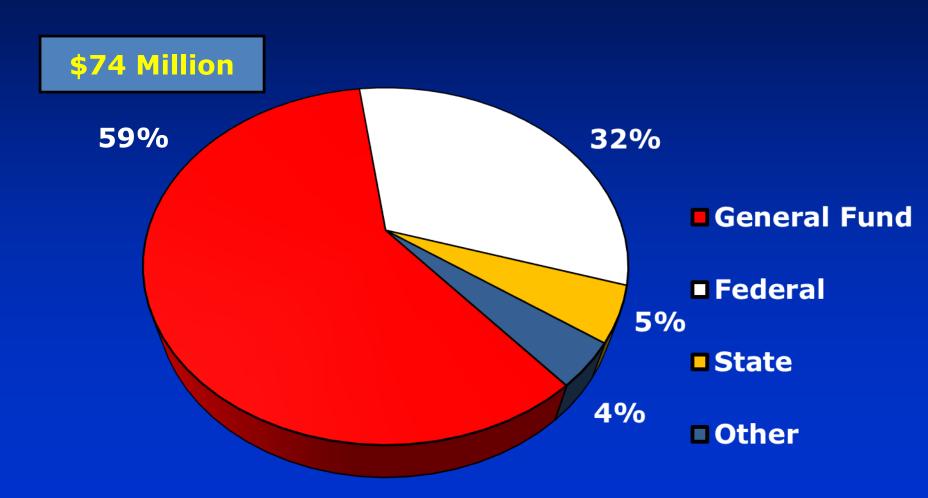

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 The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) provided over 7,600 energy grants to Orange County Citizens

 Youth and Family's CINS/FINS program was acknowledged five (5) years in a row for best

practices









- Regional History Center staff collected, catalogued, and preserved over 5,000 items from Pulse memorial sites in creating the One Orlando Collection
- Regional History Center created an exhibit of the One Orlando Collection the week of June 12th in remembrance of the Pulse tragedy





- Consumer Fraud has settled non-litigation restitution cases valued at almost \$2.3M for our citizens
- Cooperative Extension received over 18,000 volunteer hours valued over \$400K









- The Veterans' Service Program provided almost \$30M in assistance to Veterans
- Crisis & Family Assistance served almost 2,000 clients









- Head Start's school garden has increased parent engagement, teamwork, and children learning through hands on experiences
- 20 Head Start parents graduated from the pilot Getting Ahead initiative









- The After School Zone served almost 10,000 participants the first semester of school
- The Neighborhood Center for Families (NCFs) served over 15,000 clients







- Neighborhood Preservation and Revitalization
 - Provided over 2,000 hours of off-duty patrols in the areas of highest need
 - Logged over 500 hours of citizen community service in neighborhoods while completing grant projects

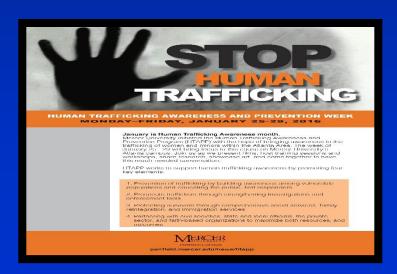
