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### **Youth Mental Health Data**

- <u>50% of all diagnoses</u> appear by the age of 14, and 75% by the age of 24
- Approximately 20% of youth have a diagnosed mental health disorder
- 2<sup>nd</sup> leading cause of death is suicide for youth aged 10-24 in 2017
  - -10% of Orange County High School Students attempted suicide in 2019 (National Average is 7.4%)
- 4,156 youth were admitted to an inpatient hospital in Orange County during 2019
- **90% of youth** who commit suicide have a mental health disorder

- OCPS initiated <u>542</u> Baker Acts last year (438 in 2017-2018, 504 in 2016-2017)
- <u>65% of youth</u> who have a mental health disorder receive treatment.
- <u>10 years</u> is the average time between identification and treatment of youth mental health disorders.
- 80% of youth in child welfare have a mental health diagnosis
- 65%-75% of youth arrested have a mental health diagnosis
- 54.8% of Orange County parents report a lack of knowledge about mental health resources







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#### **Wraparound**

- Began in 2009 Substance Abuse Mental Health Administration (SAMHSA)
  - High Fidelity Wraparound model- "in home" service delivery (ages 0-12)
  - Focus on System of Care Values: Family driven, youth guided, culturally and linguistically competent, strengthsbased, comprehensive, coordinated, community based, individualized, integrated, respectful, outcomes based, and focused on early prevention and intervention

- 2015 SAMHSA expansion grant (ages 0-21)
  - Added Open Table and Wellness Recovery Action Plan (WRAP)
- 2014 and 2017 Criminal Justice Substance Abuse Mental Health Reinvestment Grant (CJR)
  - youth aged 13-16 involved in the criminal justice system
  - Partnership with NAMI for Crisis
    Intervention Training Youth
    (CIT-Y)

#### **Wraparound Outcome Measures**

- •140 families in service simultaneously and 200 families a year
- Average length of service is 12 to 18 months
- •52% of youth served reside in the targeted zip codes in the Forefront Report
- •51% improvement in school attendance
- •37% improvement in school performance
- •Reduction in arrests from 45% to 6.5% at 12 months
- Youth improvements
  - Ability to cope when things go wrong from 35.8% to 65.9%
  - Getting along with family from 68.6% to 87.8%
- Caregiver improvements
  - Reduced caregiver stress by 30%

# **Youth Mental Health Commission 2013**

#### Six Areas of Need

- » Lack of a system design and coordination
- » Financing model disincentives and poor accountability
- » Restrictive service array: families receive the wrong mix of services
- » System complexity
- » Inadequate resources (prevention and intervention)
- » Lack of system accountability

#### **Recommendations**

- 1. Create a Management Network
- 2. Implement Strategies based on research and best practices
- 3. Build on current successes and collaborations



Through public and private funding, families will receive the supports they need regardless of ability to pay



#### **Breakthrough Pilot**



- -Dramatic and statistically significant improvements in family functioning as it relates to their work with Family Support Navigators
- -Families are extremely satisfied with Breakthrough and believe this unique approach is helping their adolescents

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### **Funding**

- Private and Public Blended and Braided Funding
- Nemours Hospital dedicated annual funding for Breakthrough
  - Includes staffing, services and research for 5 years
- Orange County Public Schools, Embrace Families and Department of Children and Families dedicated Breakthrough service funding
- Embrace Families is the Managing Partner
  - Oversees partner funds, hiring and support for Family Support Navigators













### **Funding**

# <u>Children's Services Funds:</u> \$1.3M

- Multi Systemic Therapy Psychiatric (MST Psych)
  - \$630k (start date 12/9/19)
- Modular Approach to Therapy for Children (MATCH)
  - \$340k (training completed 1/31/20, ongoing)
- Respite
  - \$330k
- Youth in 9 identified high acuity zip codes are prioritized to receive services
