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Infectious Disease Elimination Act (IDEA)

- June 26, 2019 Governor DeSantis approved the Infectious Disease Elimination Act, Section 381.0038, Florida Statutes.
- Allows county commissions to authorize a sterile needle and syringe exchange program to operate within county boundaries.
- The <u>goal</u> of the program is the <u>prevention of disease</u> <u>transmission</u> through the free exchange of clean, unused needles for used needles.



Infectious Disease Elimination Act (IDEA)

- Before an exchange program may be established, a County Commission must:
 - 1. Authorize the program under the provisions of a <u>county</u> <u>ordinance;</u>
 - Enter into a <u>letter of agreement</u> with the Florida Department of Health agreeing to operate any exchange program in accordance with the IDEA;
 - Enlist the <u>local county health department</u> to provide ongoing advice, consultation, and recommendations for the operation of the program; and



Infectious Disease Elimination Act (IDEA) Cont.

4. Contract with one of the following <u>entities to operate the</u> <u>program</u>:

- a. A hospital licensed under chapter 395.
- b. A health care clinic licensed under Part X of Chapter 400.
- c. A <u>medical school</u> in this state accredited by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education or the Commission on Osteopathic College Accreditation.
- d. A licensed addictions receiving facility.
- e. A 501(c)(3) <u>HIV/AIDS service organization</u>.



Exchange Program Requirements:

- 1. Develop an oversight and accountability system;
- 2. Provide for maximum security of exchange sites;
- 3. Operate a <u>one-to-one exchange;</u>
- 4. Make available <u>educational materials</u> regarding the transmission of HIV, viral hepatitis, and other blood-borne diseases;
- 5. Provide <u>onsite counseling or referrals</u> for drug abuse prevention, education, and treatment;
- 6. Provide onsite HIV and viral hepatitis screening or referrals;



Exchange Program Requirements Continued:

- 6. Provide kits containing an <u>emergency opioid antagonist</u>, or referrals; and
- 7. <u>Collect data</u> for annual reporting purposes.

Funding:

State, county, or municipal funds <u>may not</u> be used to operate an exchange program. Exchange programs shall be funded through grants and donations from private resources and funds.



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NEP Ordinances in Florida

According to the Florida Department of Health, as of December 2019 the following counties have passed ordinances:

- 1. Broward
- 2. Leon
- 3. Manatee
- 4. Miami-Dade
- 5. Palm Beach

Hillsborough County is drafting an ordinance for approval.



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What is a needle exchange program (NEP)?

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) define needle exchange programs (NEP) as "community-based prevention programs that can provide a range of services, including linkage to substance use disorder treatment; access to and disposal of sterile syringes and injection equipment; and vaccination, testing, and linkage to care and treatment for infectious diseases."

What does a NEP look like?

Vaccines for diseases like Hepatitis A and B and testing for diseases like HIV and Hepatitis C Counseling on treatment and prevention of HIV and Hepatitis B and C. Referral to substance use treatment programs, medical care, mental health services, and other support services

> Access to and safe disposal of sterile syringes and injection equipment








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

Orange County Newly Diagnosed HIV Cases






New HIV Cases by Race/Ethnicity 2013-17






New HIV Cases by Gender 2013-17




HIV Modes of Transmission/Risk Factors


Female HIV Exposure/Risk Factors

New HIV Cases by Zip Code of Residence 2013-2018



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Orange Count Initiatives to Address HIV

- Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) Ryan White Part A
 - In 2019 Orange County received \$10 million to provide HIV services to a four-county area
 - Increase number of HIV+ clients in care
 - Increase viral suppression
 - Identify the "hardest-to-reach" cases
 - Increase testing and linkage to care for incarcerated individuals
 - Increase awareness and education through a single website for all HIV information (testing, care, PreP, etc.)
 - Educate community providers on new HIV treatment protocols
 - Increase outreach through OC Medical Clinic for testing and referral



Orange Count Initiatives to Address HIV Cont.

- Housing Opportunities for Persons Living with AIDS (HOPWA) Program. In 2018, more than 1,000 individuals received housing assistance through the program.
- Ending the HIV Epidemic: A Plan for America (HRSA Funding Opportunity)
 - Treat people with HIV rapidly and effectively to reach sustained viral suppression
 - Respond quickly to potential HIV outbreaks to get needed prevention and treatment services to people who need them.



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IDEA Exchange Pilot: Miami-Dade County

- Miami-Dade Needle Exchange Pilot Program
- Between 12/1/16 and 7/8/19
 - enrolled 1,147 participants
 - Received 348,062 used needles
 - Distributed 334,876 unused needles
- Not enough data to determine impact on HIV and Hepatitis

Efficacy of Needle Exchange Programs

There are currently over 300 needle exchange programs across the United States with varying levels of success:

- Baltimore, Maryland There was a large decrease in the proportion of newly diagnosed *HIV cases attributed to injection drug use* from 62.6% in 1994 to 10.0% in 2017.
- New York City, New York Between 1990 to 2002 the HIV prevalence attributed to injection drug use decreased from 50% to 17%.
- <u>Tacoma, Washington</u> NEP participation was associated with more than 80% reduction in incidence of Hepatitis infections attributed to injection drug use.



Orange County surveillance data shows:

✓ HIV infections
✓ Acute Hepatitis B virus (HBV)
✓ Acute Hepatitis C virus (HCV)

No evidence that the increase in infection resulted from injection drug use
