Background

- The CARES Act was enacted into law on March 27, 2020
- Created \$150 Billion Coronavirus Relief Fund for States,
 Localities, and Tribal Governments
- Local governments serving a population of at least 500,000 can elect to receive direct funding
 - -12 Counties in Florida received direct payments
- 55 Counties in Florida must request funding through State
- Orange County received \$243.1 million on April 22, 2020
- Treasury guidance has been coming out periodically



Use of Funds

- Necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19)
- Not accounted for in the current budget
- Incurred during the period that begins on March 1, 2020, and ends on December 30, 2020
 - Unused funding must be returned after December 30, 2020

Funding <u>cannot</u> be used to replace lost revenue



- Local Government Expenses to Respond to COVID-19
 - Expenses for acquisition and distribution of medical and protective supplies, such as masks, gloves, hand sanitizers, etc...
 - Disinfection of public areas and facilities
 - Expenses for maintaining county jails as it relates to sanitation and social distancing
 - -Expenses for quarantining individuals





Background

- Local Government Expenses to Respond to COVID-19 (continued)
 - -Telework Costs
 - -Paid COVID-19 Sick & Family Medical Leave to Public Employees
 - -Payroll for those <u>substantially</u> dedicated to mitigating or responding to the COVID-19
 - Costs of providing COVID-19 testing
 - Expenses for establishing temporary public medical facilities and other measures to increase COVID-19 treatment capacity
 - May use, <u>but not required</u>, to assist with other units of governments within the county



- Local Government Expenses to Respond to COVID-19 (continued)
 - Grants to small businesses to reimburse the costs of business interruption cause by required closures
 - -Emergency financial assistance to individuals and families directly impacted by a loss of income due to COVID-19
 - -Expenses for food including distribution and/or delivery to residents including senior citizens and other vulnerable populations
 - -Expenses for care for homeless populations provided to mitigate COVID-19 effects and enable compliance with COVID-19

Small Business Grants

- Emergency relief funds to support the small brick and mortar businesses with 25 employees and under
- In discussions with Orlando Economic Partnership, Black Business Investment Fund, Prospera, Hispanic Chamber, National Entrepreneur Center, Central Florida Foundation, City of Orlando and other potential partners
- The program will offer one-time \$10,000 grants to qualifying small businesses to cover normal business expenses, such as employee wages, vendor bills and rent to help offset the significant temporary loss of revenue to qualified small businesses
- Anticipate to provide grants for up to 6,500 small businesses that will comply with the safety guidelines proposed by the Mayor's task force



Eligibility Criteria

- In business by January 1, 2020
- Have a business license in Orange County
- A brick and mortar business
- Demonstrate ongoing business operations at time of OC Mayor stay at home
 Executive Order
- Must have no more than 25 employees
- Business taxes are paid up to date
- Expected to stay in business through December 31, 2020
- Commit to following recommended COVID-19 safety guidelines





Not Eligible

- Not physically located and operated in Orange County
- Received federal funds for COVID-19 (PPP)
- Home-based business
- Non-profit corporations
- Publicly traded companies
- Code Enforcement liens
- Current findings of financial mismanagement or felony conviction





Small Business Grants Process

Submit Application Using Digital Online Portal (Initial Application Period 5 days)

Business Location, Business Status (FL Dept. of Corporation), Employee Count, Business Income and Expenses, Vendor W-9 and Signed and Attest that all Information is Truthful

Online Application Information Received by Orange County Economic Development Office and Distribute to Partner Agencies

Orange County Partners Review Application Submitted to Confirm Eligibility and Submit to Orange County Economic Development Office

Internal Team to Provide Final Review and Oversight

Comptroller's Office for Processing of Payment

Partners to Follow-up with Businesses and Provide Financial Status Reports

Two Sub Categories

- 1. Individual and Family Assistance Program \$36.5 Million
 - Orange County to provide one-time financial assistance for affected residents to help bridge financial gaps for overdue rent, mortgage payments, medical bills, and utilities.
 - Eligible individual and family struggling due to loss of income would receive \$1,000 per household.
- 2. Direct Assistance to Social Services Agencies \$36.5 Million
 - Assistance for community child care operations, job retraining, homelessness, mental health services, food pantries, and other social services impacted by COVID-19



Individual and Family Assistance Program - \$36.5 Million

- Eligibility Criteria
 - Orange County Resident
 - -US Citizenship / Legal Permanent Resident
 - -Demonstrate loss of income as a direct result of COVID-19
 - Layoff or furlough notice
 - Proof of reduction in hours





Individual and Family Assistance Program Process - \$36.5 Million

Submit Application Using Digital Online Portal (1,000 a week)

Application Information - Orange County Resident, US Citizenship / Legal Permanent Resident, Layoff notice, furlough notice, proof of reduction in work hours, other necessary information

Online Application Information Received by Orange County Community and Family Services Office

Direct Assistance to Social Services Agencies - \$36.5 Million

Childcare

- -Social distancing is impacting capacity for daycares
- May need temporary dividers to allow additional groups of children in larger rooms
- Startup funding and accelerated licensing to allow teachers with appropriate current credentials and background clearance to open family childcare businesses to serve young children
- Access to timely, affordable, and consistently available sanitation items,
 paper products and PPE
- -Working with community partners to assist



- Job Retraining Program
 - -In discussions with CareerSource Central Florida
 - Direct placement opportunities for severely impacted job seekers
 - -Partner with education providers to increase the availability for short term, industry recognized training opportunities.
 - Provide adversely impacted career seekers "workforce support resources" to ensure continued training and employment without interruption



- Homelessness
 - Rapid re-housing for families expanding current program
 - Expand prevention/diversion to include motel/hotel residents
 - -Supportive services for families and individuals- personal protective equipment, food supports, employment training/assistance, portable sanitation stations, and increased outreach
 - Coordinated entry system HUB expansion and staffing
 - -Staffing for drop in center Samaritan Resource Center
 - -Technology needs



- Mental Health
 - -Expansion of crisis services, outreach, mobile crisis services
 - -Expand capacity of inpatient care, mental health, and substance use
 - Increased staffing capacity for crisis intervention
 - -Extend current children's mental health projects
 - -Develop a behavioral health and substance use web navigation system
 - Assist pro bono agencies in connecting to their services



- Food Pantry Distribution and Delivery
 - Working with various food providers to ensure food supply and distribution needs are being met
 - -Engaging with local food banks for meal delivery



Orange County Public Safety and Health Expenditures - \$48.6 Million

- This funding will be used to pay public safety and health expenditures for Orange County to include items such as:
 - Sanitizing agents
 - Personal protective equipment
 - Thermometers
 - Other public safety and health equipment



- Already committed over \$10 million so far on public safety and health expenditures related to COVID-19
 - 3 million Face Masks
 - 870,000 travel-size (2-oz.) hand sanitizer bottles
 - Many other COVID-19 health expenditure items



Orange County Public Safety and Health Expenditures - \$48.6 Million

- Other eligible expenditures under this category
 - -Telecommuting technology costs
 - -Paid COVID-19 sick & family medical leave to public employees
 - -COVID-19 testing expenditures
 - —Contact tracing
 - -Facility sanitization needs
 - Facility modifications

• Funding for municipalities and constitutional offices must follow the same expenditure rules under the CARES Act-CRF

 Orange County to reimburse COVID-19 expenditures to municipalities and constitutional officers


Process of Reimbursement

Next Steps

- Working aggressively to establish small business financial assistance programs and social services programs
- -Continue to purchase personal protective equipment and other public safety items for the community and organization
- Ongoing communication with municipalities and constitutional offices to reimburse their COVID-19 expenditures
- -Anticipate to receive over \$255 million in grant funding for COVID-19
- -Coronavirus Relief Funds of \$243.1 million must be expended by December 30, 2020.
