Definitions

- Poultry (Ch. 38) refers to chickens, roosters, turkeys, ducks, geese, and pigeons
 - Chickens refers to female chickens and are also called Hens
 - Roosters are male chickens
- Hen Coop is an enclosure designed for roosting of hens and protection from sunlight and effects of weather
- –Pen Area area used by hens for foraging (excludes the hen coop)





Currently Allowed Uses - Chapter 38 – Zoning

- Agricultural Districts (A-1, A-2, A-R)
 - Domestic and commercial operations
 - Up to 5 acres: <= 30 poultry
 - 5-10 acres: <= 100 poultry
 - > 10 acres: no limit



- Rural Country Estates (RCE) Area (RCE, RCE-2, RCE-5)
 - Domestic use only
 - Limit of <= 12 poultry (no roosters)

-Prohibited in all other zoning districts











Previous Board Actions

- -2013 Decided not to move forward based on public testimony
- -2016 Board directed staff to prepare draft code
 - Advisory Board reviews: AAB / PZC / ASAB / Sustainability
 - Public Engagement HOA and Community Association Notices
- -2017 Board work session scheduled but canceled due to Hurricane Irma
 - Draft Ordinance placed on hold due to local news about coyotes and CDC advisory on salmonella

- Status of other Florida Counties
 - –Jacksonville/Duval ordinance for SFR in 2015
 - -Hillsborough proposed ordinance for SFR in draft
 - -Palm Beach not allowed in residential districts
 - -Broward Ag and RCE permitted, select municipalities
 - Miami-Dade Ag and RCE permitted, select municipalities





Proposed County Ordinance

- -Allows permit for chickens in SFR and Mobile Home districts
 - R-1AAAA, R-1AAA residential urban
 - R-1AA, R-1A –larger lots, low density
 - R-1, R-2, R-3 smaller lots, low/medium density
 - RT-1, RT-2 SFR and Mobile Homes (owned)
 - R-L-D, NR higher density

-Ordinance will not override private covenants and restrictions

• PDs or HOAs

















Basic Criteria

- -Permit required, small fee
- -Up to 4 hens for personal egg consumption
- -No sales
- -No roosters or other poultry allowed
- -No onsite slaughtering
- -UF/IFAS Extension Orange County training required
- -Coop and pen standards
- -Care and keeping standards

Coop and pen area standards

- Size

- Coop and pen area 100 sq. ft. maximum
- Coop 4 sq. ft. per hen minimum
- Pen area 10 sq. ft. per hen minimum

Height

- Coop and pen area 6 ft. maximum
- Property boundary setbacks
 - Side/Side Street yard 15 feet
 - Rear yard 10 feet
 - High water line 50 feet





Coop and pen area standards

- -Must be completely enclosed
 - Wire Mesh/similarly strong material no "chicken wire"
 - Fencing must be buried to defeat digging predators
- -Must include tie-downs for wind resistance
- Opaque fencing or vegetation for visual barrier of the coop and pen area
 - Match height of coop/pen
 - Maximum 6 feet
- -Must be kept clean and maintained





- Other standards and requirements
 - -Access to food and water at all times
 - -Feed kept in rodent proof feeder and container when stored
 - -Composting allowed with 20 ft setback
 - -Chickens kept under custody and control of resident if outside pen area
 - -Unwanted hens must go to a farm or agribusiness accepting chickens
 - -Follow FL Statute for deceased chickens
 - If ordinance repealed, 10 year allowance for permittees to remove chickens, coop and pen area





Implementation

- -Zoning issues permit based on submitted plans/drawings
 - Permit is revoked if two violations
 - Permit is not transferrable
- -No Building inspection
- –Neighborhood Services (Code Compliance) will address complaints/violations per normal process
 - Permit allows for backyard access
- Animal Services and Sheriff's Office only respond to animal cruelty or public safety issues
